COUNTRY AND MARINE PARKS BOARD

Country and Marine Parks Authority Progress Report (1.3.2017 – 30.6.2017)

Purpose

This paper aims to provide members a general overview on management and protection work conducted by the Country and Marine Parks Authority during the period between 1.3.2017 – 30.6.2017. It provides various figures and information for facilitating members to understand and offer advice to the Authority regarding the management of country and marine parks.

A. Country Parks & Special Areas

1. Country Parks Management

1.1 <u>Management Services</u>

Routine maintenance of all recreational facilities within county parks and special areas was carried out regularly for public enjoyment. Major country parks facilities provided and amount of refuse collected are shown below for reference.

1.3 <u>Permitted Events</u>

In the reporting period, 257 permits were given under Reg. 11 of the Country Parks and Special Areas Regulation to hold events in country parks. Most of these events were related to sport competition, location filming and raising funds for charity.

1.4 <u>Control of Development</u>

A total of 31 development proposals were received. There was no objection to nine of them, the other 21 were being processed and one was cancelled. Most of these were related to minor works concerning electricity supply and slope works.

2. Visitor Services/Education

2.1 <u>Visitor Statistics</u>

B. Marine Parks and Marine Reserve

1. Marine Parks and Marine Reserve Management

The Brothers Marine Park was designated on 30 December 2016 and became the fifth marine park in Hong Kong. It is situated in the northern Lantau waters and covers a total sea area of about 970 hectares. The new marine park serves to better protect the Chinese White Dolphins, their habitats and enhance the marine and fisheries resources in the region.

2.5 During the report period, our Marine Parks Ambassador participated in the following volunteer services: Yan Chau Tong Marine Park Coastal Clean-up and Hong Kong Marine Biodiversity Roving Exhibition. A total of 27 ambassadors joined the above activities.

2.6 Up to 30 June 2017, a total of 130 Marine Parks Ambassadors have completed 20 hours services; 48 Ambassador have completed 40 hours services; 28 Ambassadors have completed 70 hours services; 17 Ambassadors have completed 100 hours services, 12 Ambassadors have completed 150 hours services and 6 Ambassadors completed 200 hours service. They were awarded with the "Jellyfish Service Badge", "Nautilus Service Badge", "Fiddler Crab Service Badge", "Starfish Service Badge", "Humphead Wrasse Service Badge" and "Chinese White Dolphin Service Badge" respectively. Until the end of June 2017, the accumulated service hours of marine parks ambassadors are 9,538 hours.

3. Law Enforcement

3.1 During the report period, a total of 2,386 advices and 35 verbal warnings were given to fishermen and visitors and two prosecutions were taken against offenders in Marine Parks and Marine Reserve.

During the report period, the prosecution cases are not necessarily the same as the completed hearing cases.

3.2 To strengthen the exchange of intelligence and communication on combating the illegal fishing activities among AFCD, Hong Kong Marine Police (Marpol) and Guangdong Fisheries Administration General Brigade Shenzhen sub-office, a 24-hour Joint Enforcement Operation from 19 – 20 April 2017 was conducted. AFCD and Marpol, each deployed four patrol vessels in Hong Kong northeastern waters, whilst Guangdong Fisheries Administration General Brigade Shenzhen sub-office deployed 11 patrol vessels for carrying out patrolling in the operation. In this operation, AFCD inspected 26 fishing vessels involving 58 fishermen and two mainland fishing vessels involving two mainland fishermen in Hong Kong waters. Two mainland mechanized sampans that were found fishing illegally in Hong Kong waters were transferred to Marpol and then were returned to Guangdong Fisheries Administration General Brigade Shenzhen sub-office. AFCD also received a suspected illegal fishing vessel referred from Guangdong Fisheries Administration General Brigade Shenzhen sub-office via Marpol. Verbal warning was given to the mainland fishermen on board. They were explained with the Fisheries Protection Ordinance. Summary of regulations and maps of marine parks were also given to the mainland fishermen for reminding them to comply with the relevant regulations.
